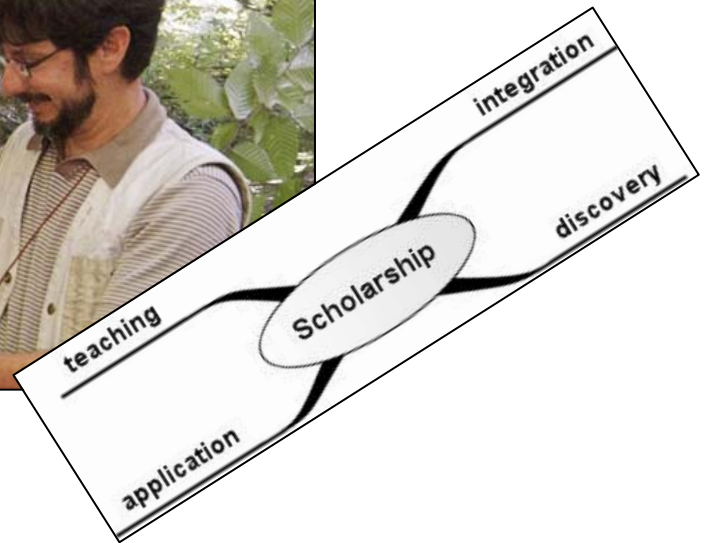

It's been more than 10 years since Ernest Boyer published "Scholarship Reconsidered,"

offering academia a new paradigm recognizing a fuller range of scholarly activity. Since then, a growing number of faculty have embraced Boyer's expanded definitions of scholarship. Tenure and promotion guidelines have been revised to reflect his categories: Discovery, Integration, Application and Teaching. His approaches to community based research and teaching have inspired faculty to expand and integrate their research, teaching and service.

These academic practices compel us to focus on our campus' faculty reward processes.

This workshop will provide campus teams of faculty, administrators and staff with opportunities to:

- Engage in workshops and facilitated dialogues about challenges for civically engaged faculty in current faculty rewards processes on our campuses
- Exchange promising practices from our institutions and networks
- Analyze current faculty rewards policies, leadership, and practices using tailored tools
- Build forward from these practices to context-specific implementation scenarios

Teams will leave the workshop with a plan of action to support engaged scholarship.

Is it possible for scholarship to be defined in ways that give more recognition to interpretive and integrative work? Can we define scholarship in ways that respond more adequately to the urgent new realities both within the academy and beyond?

Facilitators

Cathy Burack is a Senior Fellow at the Center for Youth and Communities in the Heller School for Social Policy and Management at Brandeis University. Prior to coming to Brandeis, Cathy was the Associate Director of the New England Resource Center for Higher Education (NERCHE), where she continues her affiliation as a Senior Associate. For the past fifteen years Cathy has focused on ways faculty, students and administrators can work together to fulfill the civic missions of their colleges and universities. She is also a Campus Compact Engaged Scholar.



Timothy K. Eatman is Assistant Professor of Higher Education at Syracuse University and Director for Research of Imagining America. Tim has provided research leadership for the Tenure Team Initiative on Public Scholarship since its inception. Professor Eatman also pursues research on students from groups that are traditionally underrepresented in higher education. Eatman conducts research that examines the relationship among institutional policies, programs, and college student development. With Julie Ellison, he co-authored, "Scholarship in Public: Knowledge Creation and Tenure Policy in the Engaged University".



David Scobey is the Director of the Harvard Center for Community Partnerships and the Donald W. and Ann M. Harvard Professor of Community Partnerships at Bates College. Scobey was Chair of the National Advisory Board of Imagining America: Artists and Scholars in Public Life, and he co-chairs (with Tim Eatman) IA's Working Group on Tenure. Scobey is an urban and cultural historian with a doctorate in American Studies. Before coming to Bates, he was a Professor of Architecture at the University of Michigan, where he founded the Arts of Citizenship Program.
